## Work in progress

*Seeing Reason*—a general account of the normative structure of the activity of arguing, covering theoretical issues such as burden of proof, premise adequacy, the definition of argument and the function of arguing, based on the practices evident in the U.S. Congressional debate over entry in the first Gulf War and the O.J. Simpson trial.

"Memphis, Marching"—continuing my work on authority, analyzing the force of the moral authority of civil rights protesters in the Memphis garbage workers' strike in 1968.

Biofuels in the Long Run—I am opening a new project on the rhetoric surrounding the bioeconomy initiatives in Iowa. To plan well, policymakers and the public must think deeply in time, broadly in space, and about systemic complexity. What rhetorical resources exist that will help them do so?
